I am honored to be chosen by my fellow quilters to be this years featured quilter.

My sewing career started as a youngster creating doll clothes. By age 12, I was designing and making my own clothes. During college I sewed for others, mostly wedding and bridesmaid dresses. I made small appliquéd dresses to prom dresses for my daughter and blankets for her horse. Our homes needed curtains, drapes, bedspreads and upholstery.

I thought I had pretty much made everything there was that included fabric until I experienced quilting. In 1997, we bought a mountain house and I had 6 beds needing covering. I took my first quilt class-Eleanor Burns, Quilt in a Day. It definitely took more than a day. I liked the process and my quilt held up for 23 years on the bed! My next endeavor was a queen size with over 3800 tiny pieces! After that I learned to choose my patterns more carefully!

I was so excited to find this new outlet, everyone got quilts! I got hooked on going to quilt shows everywhere! I moved to Chico and in 2009 Ann Slocum said let's take a class from Donna Greenwald. Donna opened me up to a whole new world of fusing, thread painting, and embellishments called art quilts, which are still my favorite to create. I wouldn't call myself a traditional quilter, I get bored making repetitive blocks. I love the creative process of making a colorful quilt whether it be with a pattern or my own design. I have enjoyed dying and printing my own fabrics. I like to choose designs that will challenge me with fabric elections, new techniques, or a free motion quilting challenge.

This will help make things a bit easier as we held our last show there and that means the floor plan is basically done with a few minor tweaks. There are still a couple of committees that need a chair. Pick - a - Prize -- This committee asks members to donate a completed basket or items to go into a basket. It would be nice to have somewhere between 10 - 20 nice baskets. The committee can get items donated from national suppliers of quilting supplies by writing them for a donation, such as Quilter's Dream batting or Quiltfolk Magazine, or see if local stores would offer items. If you attend the Yuba City Quilt Show, their baskets will give you lots of ideas. I've seen baskets that had a theme of flowers, so it would include gardening tools, seeds, some gardening themed fabric or a garden themed pattern, and a plant.

The Pick a Prize committee has a small budget to augment the items in the baskets as needed. Then they are wrapped in clear wrap with an appropriate bow to make it look enticing with a recap of what's in the basket. It just takes a couple of ladies who can coordinate getting the baskets together and then get members to work a shift at the show. *Memorial* – This committee provides a small display to commemorate the members who have passed away since our last quilt show. It normally will include a picture of the quilter and a brief bio and perhaps some pictures of their quilts.

The Quilt Committee is recommending that this year we have a "judged" show. This would be an opportunity for personal growth in your quilting. An independent judge, Arlene Arnold, would review the quilts that members want to enter and make notes about the quilt. While I was not able to attend the actual meeting from their January meeting, I did watch the recorded meeting as their speaker was of interest.

The speaker was Dr. Linda Wilson, Professor of Computer Science, Texas Lutheran University and her topic was Important Cyber Security. The information was so powerful that I felt I had to share it with all the members. The highlights were how important it is to keep up with how the scammers work at getting into our personal information and what they can do to create havoc in our lives.

There have been a couple of suspicious emails purporting to be me being sent to members of the Guild. The suspicious emails seem to be generated from the Guild email address. What I have learned is that we need to take this more seriously. The biggest suggestion Dr. Wilson provided was changing our passwords every 6 - 12 months and to use a different one for each website we visit regularly. I know that is a pain, but just like we would not leave our cars unlocked with the keys in the ignition, we need to take precautions. If you would like to watch the meeting yourself to get all of the tips that were given, you can go to https://www.sccqg.org/ and on the front page the January 13th meeting has a link as well as the password to use for the meeting.

I came away with I am going to subscribe to a Password keeper app that will protect all my passwords while I only must remember one to access them. The professor recommended 3 of them which I will research which one meets my needs.
